## **Skegness Junior Academy Remote Learning Plan**

Daily reading can be recorded on the e-reading record available from class teachers on Teams.



In order to ensure that learning is continued, irrespective of lockdown and self-isolation, Skegness Junior Academy has developed the following plan. This plan offers remote learning opportunities whilst also acknowledging that some households have limited access to devices and would require hard-copies of work and resources.

This plan will be applied in the following instances:

- 1. An individual is self-isolating because of a positive test within the household or due to symptoms meaning they are isolating for 10 days or as directed by the latest Government guidance.
- 2. A whole bubble or cohort is self-isolating because of an outbreak of coronavirus
- 3. In a lock down situation where the site is open to a limited cohort of children

The plan complies with the expectations and principles outlined in the DFE document Guidance for Full Opening of Schools.

#### Software and online platforms

Within all plans, teachers will set appropriate work in-line with our current curriculum. Our remote learning option across KS2 will be primarily through Microsoft Teams and supplemented by a range of resources including the Oak Academy and our online subscriptions such as Twinkl, Reading Eggs, TTRockstars etc.

Children will remain in contact with their Class teacher through MS Teams and Class Dojo where necessary. Staff will make welfare phone calls a least once a week dependent on the circumstances. Any concerns will be recorded on our safeguarding systems and the DSL/Deputy DSL will be alerted.

The Oak Academy lessons are in-line with our teaching ethos – they encourage the use of retrieval practice, explicit teaching with high quality modelling, and the use of deliberate practice. The online lessons are free to all and offer a recorded taught session so that the children can access physical teaching from a teacher and then access work relating to that lesson within the same website. There are also hundreds of lessons specifically aimed at children with SEND needs and requiring additional support. The Oak Academy resources will be offered as an alternative for families who can't access Microsoft Teams.

White Rose Maths resources will be used to support maths teaching and learning as they are matched to our current maths curriculum model.

MS Teams will support school in offering true online learning with the opportunity for the children to communicate with their teacher through live video. Often this will be used so children can 'drop-in' to receive further support, for celebrating and sharing successes individually or within a group.

Class Dojo will remain in use where needed. Teachers and parents will be able to message one another to share information and offer support for families not able to access Teams.

In the event of any form of isolation and loss of learning caused by Coronavirus, parents must understand that engagement in home learning is compulsory, as is the expectation of the DFE that Skegness Junior Academy makes that provision available and accessible to all. However, if children themselves are too ill to attend then they should not be expected to engage in home learning.

In preparation for home-learning, parents and children need to receive logins and passwords for the following platforms (likewise teaching staff need to be familiar with them):

#### **Worksheets and Practical Resources**

If a child is isolated from school i.e. the child is sent home from school to either receive a test or self-isolate as someone in the household is being tested, they will leave school with a pack of work and their own stationery pack. Children will have immediate opportunity to continue their learning.

The work packs should be basic skills work that would be relevant at any stage of the year i.e. arithmetic, spelling, reading, writing (with a visual prompt) and handwriting. These may be in the form of an age appropriate CGP workbook. If a child becomes ill at home and starts to self-isolate the workbook will be delivered to the home address and posted through the door to ensure that there is no contact between the family and the staff member.

#### **Remote Learning**

In the case of whole cohort isolation, with notice, the children will be sent home with their workbook. If there is no notice and the children are already at home a text/email will be sent to the parents directing them to the Oak Academy resources in the first instance if necessary. This measure will afford teachers a short time to prepare their remote learning resources, in line with their current topic, which will be added to Microsoft Teams. Children identified as having no access to remote learning will have a workbook delivered. A limited supply of devices provided by the DFE are available to loan from the academy site.

### Curriculum, expectation and teaching approaches

We plan to follow the same curriculum (as closely as possible) remotely as we do in school.

We expect that remote education (including remote teaching and independent work) will take pupils broadly the following number of hours each day:

KS1 – 3 hours

KS2 – 4 hours

If your child has SEN, it may be necessary to amend these timings. The SENDco will be able to advise on specific cases when needed.

When we need to make closures to bubbles or during a lockdown order, we will -

- Collect information from parents and carers to assess their requirement for devices/learning packs including internet acess information.
- Once this information is collated, we will contact parents/carers to distribute devices, workpacks, including where possible, the provision of dongles and SIMS.
- Once we have established the level of need and distributed the resources at our disposal, children will be able to submit work remotely using Teams and methods reinforced while children are on site.
- If children are using hard copies, they can submit work by taking photos and sending them to class teachers or by teachers maintaining contact with families via phone.

Teaching approaches-

These will be a combination of-

- live teaching (online lessons)
- recorded teaching (e.g. Oak National Academy lessons, video/audio recordings made by teachers)
- printed paper packs produced by teachers (e.g. workbooks, worksheets)
- textbooks and reading books pupils have at home
- commercially available websites supporting the teaching of specific subjects or areas, including video clips or sequences
- Limited project work and/or internet research activities (as per the schools full opening guidance, schools full opening guidance)
